

# Information for conference delegates

The joint  $C_3/2YC3$  conference will be held at Sir Wilfred Grenfell College, Corner Brook, Newfoundland from June 12 to 15, 1997. Corner Brook is a picturesque city on the west coast of Newfoundland with a population of about 23,000 people. Newfoundland, an island, is the easternmost province of Canada.

## **Travel to Corner Brook**

#### By air

Corner Brook is served by two regional airlines: Air Atlantic which is a partner with Canadian Airlines, and Air Nova which is a partner with Air Canada. There are two airports close to Corner Brook: Deer Lake, 56 km (40 miles) to the east and Stephenville, 86 km (56 miles) to the west. Both regional airlines use Halifax, Nova Scotia to connect flights in Newfoundland. Our local travel agent informs us that there are still a limited number of "seat sale fares" available for delegates from the US, connecting from Boston or Newark, through Halifax. Ground transport (shared limousine service) is available from Deer Lake airport to most major hotels in Corner Brook. The cost per person is about \$14 including tax, unless you happen to be the only passenger in the limousine, in which case it is about \$20. Most of the common car rental agencies (Avis, Budget, Hertz, National, Tilden, Rent-a-Wreck, Sears and Thrifty) have offices at the airport and some have offices in Corner Brook as well.

### By ca

Marine Atlantic operates regular ferry service between North Sydney, Nova Scotia and Port aux Basque, Newfoundland. The ferry crossing usually takes anywhere from five to seven hours. Port aux Basque is about 220 km (175 miles) from Corner Brook. For ferry schedules and reservation contact Marine Atlantic at tel: 1-800-341-7981.

## Accommodation

Two types of accommodation is available for conference participants: student residence (college dorms) on campus, and hotels off campus.

The college residence room is \$29 per night (tax included). Reservations should be made on the conference registration form.

The Glynmill Inn has been designated as the conference hotel. The conference rate is \$68 (plus 15% tax) per night. The Glynmill Inn is the closest hotel to Sir Wilfred Grenfell College, with a pleasant 20-minute walk to the college (the last part is up a steep hill). A college vehicle will pick up conference delegates from the hotel in the morning and return in the evening. There are a number of other hotels in Corner Brook: the Holiday Inn Corner Brook (tel (709) 634-5381 or 1-800-399-5381); the Best Western Mamateek Inn (tel: (709) 639-8901 or 1-800-563-8600); and the Comfort Inn (tel (709) 639-1980 or 1-800-668-4200). The Holiday Inn is also within reasonable walking distance of the college, but the Best Western and Comfort Inn are not.

## **General Information**

The island of Newfoundland has its own time zone, 1 1/2 hours ahead of Eastern time. The climate in western Newfoundland tends to be cool in June (about 15°C average). Thus it would be advisable to bring some warm and waterproof clothing.

# The conference program

The conference program is exciting and full. It features over 20 speakers representing the diversity and the complexity of the discipline. All presentations will be held in LC 301, a lecture theatre in the Library and Computer Building of the College. The Computer Interface Workshop will take place in the Environmental Chemistry Laboratory, in the Arts and Science building.
